
A space f everyone

An ambitious project on a modest budget is transforming a boggy area at Warburton Primary School into an interesting and inviting space – an asset which not only rehabilitates an environmentally degraded area but will benefit both students and the broader community.

Co-ordinated and driven by local community stalwart, Bruce Normand, the 'multi-purpose space' project has a series of goals:

- To collect water emerging onto the School property from the south and divert it – through a series of designed channels, drains, ponds and water features – into a shallow trenchshaped catchment pond to the north of the area (at the bottom of the slope).
- To largely eliminate the current proliferation of weeds and, with sympathetic revegetation, provide sustainable habitat for endemic species of flora and fauna.
- To create a series of tracks which will serve as a selfguided nature trail of educational benefit to students and the general public.
- To build a small amphitheatre into the gradient as a focal point, creating a useful recreational area for students and for diverse community activities.
- To minimise future maintenance and optimise access to and usage of the area.
- To establish a small, productive, semi-formal orchard to extend the School's ongoing commitment to food security, complemented by feature trees and shrubs.
- To involve students and friends of the School in all practicable stages of the project and, likewise, the broader community.

Thanks to UYCE sponsorship, major earthworks were completed in February and ongoing plantings through to Winter this year will complete Stage 1 of the project.



The balance of UYCE's funding of \$1250 will be invested in fruit trees, feature trees and sundry items such as stakes and fertiliser.

Several drains and pools now have been excavated and most of the walking track is formed; nearly all unwanted vegetation has been removed; a variety of ferns and other site-appropriate species have been purchased (or salvaged) and transferred to their final locations.

The School has allocated \$1000 of its own to purchase a range of endemic grasses, sedges, rushes, etc., plus further sundry materials.

'It is very satisfying to see a relatively small budget go so far to create what will be a very beautiful, functional and productive area,' said Co-Principal, Neil Jorgensen.

'Without this magnificent contribution by Bruce – over more than a year – and the generosity of Upper Yarra Community Enterprise, this wonderful space could never have happened.'

Catprint Productions — \$2383 contribution toward 'Theatre for the Masses' project

Locally-based theatre group, Catprint Productions, are planning to present a series of performances this year – three different, full length productions comprising a comedy, a mystery thriller and a social satire.

The scale of this enterprise is demonstrated by the numbers involved: a total of 20 performances at two venues, featuring 19 performers and a crew of twelve.

'Using the magnificent facilities of the Upper Yarra Arts Centre in Warburton and Burrinja in Upwey, two different directors will head different production crews,' said organiser, Claire Bamford.

'While we have been self-funded to date – generating our own income to pay for props, costuming and advertising – UYCE's generosity will cover the costs of performance rights, scripts and makeup for the duration of the season,' Claire said, 'and we expect that proceeds from ticket sales will help fund the 2013 program.'

Given the amount of community support and goodwill they have already received from the general public, the two venues and other theatre groups, Catprint Productions are very confident that the project will soon become largely self-financing.

UYCH Community College - \$5000 contribution to 'Girl Power' Project

Warburton Primary School – \$450 contribution toward Zoo Trip Learning Project

School excursions form a valuable part of our children's education, but unfortunately some families cannot afford the extra costs involved and, as a consequence, many students miss out.

UYCE's small grant to Warburton Primary will top up funding provided by Zoos Victoria's 'Access for All' initiative, enabling 32 students to attend a learning program at Melbourne Zoo.

Warburton Christian Playgroup — \$2600 donation to fund 2012 program

Operating from the Redwood Centre (formerly the Warburton Christian School) since 2005, Warburton Christian Playgroup is a whole-community open program which welcomes children from newborns up to age five.

The Playgroup has a strong emphasis on safe, structured activities which are focussed on the needs of individual children – and also assists parents who attend the sessions, for example by offering access to a free lending library.

Our contribution will fund a small wage for the program facilitator, two mornings a week.

Not only does the Playgroup provide an inclusive and much-needed service to the Upper Yarra, it reaches out to the broader community.

For example, last year it raised \$200 for a severely disabled child in order to provide some play equipment and hosted a barbeque to raise money for a village clinic in rural Cambodia

Warburton Bowls Club - \$35,000 sponsorship of bowling green refurbishment

Major moves are afoot in Warburton's traditional sports hub at the Warburton Recreation Reserve!

As part of a significant initiative driven by our Bowls, Football, Cricket and Netball Clubs, in partnership with Yarra Ranges Council, a \$255,000 redevelopment has already seen the Bowls Club hand over its 'top green' for conversion into a netball court; this has been completed, as have new practice nets for the Cricket Club.

UYCE's contribution, complementing \$120,000 of Club funds and a grant of \$100,000 from the Shire, will cover the cost of completely replacing the remaining green and providing proper drainage, new concrete surrounds and new shelters.

'It was a big decision for us to give our top green and [second] clubhouse away, which in turn has resulted in excellent relations being developed between all of our clubs,' said Bowls Club representative, Steve Freestone.

MiSFiT Theatre — \$3180 sponsorship of a documentary project

MISFIT Theatre is a highly regarded and successful local youth theatre group, established in 2009 to perform an original show written by Sarah Ward, 'While Your Lips Are Still Red'.

In Sarah's own words, it is 'a story about difference, which along the way gathered together a group of people with differences in religion and social standing, people who have physical disabilities, intellectual disabilities and mental illness ... the shy and the outgoing ...'

As part of the Theatre's vision to build their skills and secure their future, they plan to document the creation and performance of a reworked version of Sarah's original piece, currently being prepared for National Youth Week 2012 with solid support from Yarra Ranges Council.

The professionally produced documentary – featuring interviews with performers and crew, as well as extracts from rehearsals and the live show – will serve more than one purpose.

Not only will it will be used to educate people about MISFIT and why it means to much to the young participants, it will also be used to promote the group when seeking further opportunities to develop and grow; for example, MISFIT is planning to seek State and Federal funding to work with Red Stitch Theatre – a professional, actor run company based in Melbourne – for a period of six months.

SES Upper Yarra — \$1,603 contribution for Community Education Project

Like the local CFA brigades, our SES volunteers are among the quietest of 'quiet achievers' in our community.

Rarely in the public spotlight or receiving acclaim, they just turn up during an emergency – which can be anything from traffic accidents to search and rescue to natural disasters – and get on with the job, quickly and efficiently.

Over the past couple of years, community education has become a major focus for SES Upper Yarra: striving to increase our knowledge about how be better prepared and more resilient when facing emergency situations.

Our contribution will pay for a marquee, a PA system, presentation software and furniture.

Woods Point Gun Club — \$3000 major sponsorship

With a membership of 99 – adults and juniors – Woods Point Gun Club is one of the largest registered clubs in our region.

Among a range of activities, the Festival featured live music, a car display, an historical display, road safety information and a range of market stalls, while several local organisations and activities were also on display.

Yarra Valley Community Health — \$2000 contribution toward 'You & I' initiative

We are very pleased to join a partnership between Yarra Valley Community Health, Ranges Community Health and Yarra Ranges Council in delivering an innovative, regional approach to educating our youth in understanding the value of developing equal, respectful relationships.

Using a process called 'photovoice', participants use photographs to record and reflect their own – and their community's – strengths and challenges: these are then critiqued and discussed within groups before being shared with the broader community.

Locally, students from Upper Yarra Secondary College will work with an experienced community artist over several sessions to develop deeper understanding of their relationships through this creative media project, which also offers a series of extra benefits: increased awareness of the harmful effects of violence and bullying; skills development in critical thinking, photography and project management, and enhanced engagement with the local community.

Upper Yarra Community House — \$20,000 sponsorship of 'First Flush' facility

Instigated by UYCH (a co-tenant at the former DSE depot on the Rail Trail in Yarra Junction) and Upper Yarra Museum, 'First Flush' is a shared toilet on the boundary between the two sites.

The unisex, disabled-friendly facility was delayed for almost three years due to a couple of planning challenges: its proposed location on Crown land is also subject to a 'heritage overlay'.

Our substantial contribution complements funding from the Department of Planning and Community Development and Yarra Ranges Council.

Assisted by CareForce volunteers (the second tenant of the former DSE site) contractors recently completed the toilet, which will prove a massive relief to all stakeholders!

Yarra Junction Football and Netball Club — \$5000 sponsorship

Our partnership with Yarra Junction Football and Netball Club continues into 2012 with renewed sponsorship of team uniforms and signage at the Eagles home ground, representing the second instalment of a three-year branding package.

Upper Yarra Community House — \$50,000 sponsorship of Community Work Skills Centre

As we move further into the twenty-first century the 'trades skills shortage' in the Australian workforce is becoming a matter of increasing concern.

Upper Yarra Community House (UYCH) is determined to play a role in reversing this decline by offering appropriate, accredited training within the local community by developing state of the art facilities at two sites in Yarra Junction.

Between them, the sites will offer training programs in engineering and woodwork – including construction – as part of vocational training packages (for example, preapprenticeship programs such as Certificate II in Construction).

Students from local secondary schools also will have access to these facilities, as well as UYCH Community College students and the broader community; for example, hobby and lifestyle courses and 'Men's Shed' activities.

UYCE's substantial contribution will pay for the construction of three industry-standard welding cubicles at one of the sites and, at the other, will provide tools and equipment needed for carpentry and woodwork.

'Multi-skilling is a key to successful job acquisition nowadays,' said UYCH CEO, Sally Brennan.

'Between them, the two sites will offer training that will help equip the individual with a variety of industry relevant skills.'

Warburton Advancement League - \$1500 for Community Bus refurbishment

A common sight up and down the highway since 2008, the district bus – purchased by the League with UYCE funding – has become an important resource to the Upper Yarra community.

Being available to community groups for outings and tours, as well as for private functions, at an affordable rate – \$30 per hour, plus fuel – means that the popular 21-seater requires frequent maintenance and the occasional upgrade.

Our current contribution will cover the costs of repairs to surface rust, reupholstering the driver's seat and the installation of a reversing camera.
